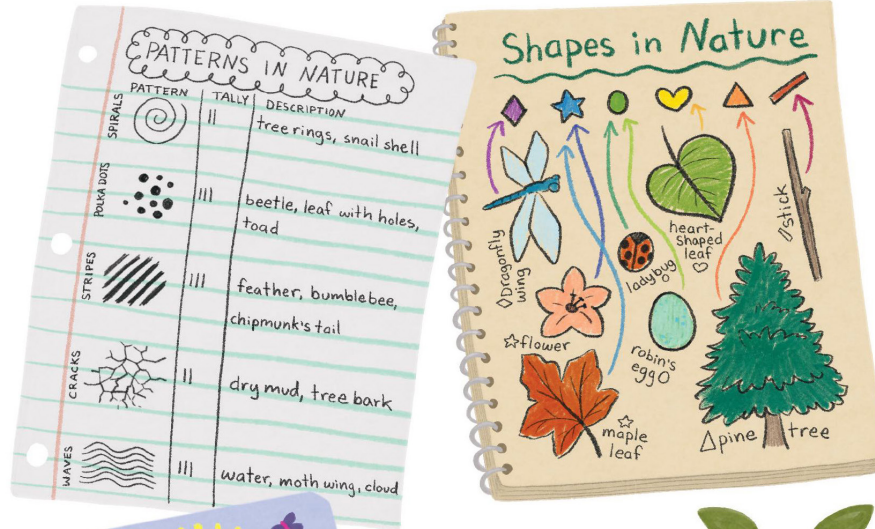
# Nature Scavenger Hunt

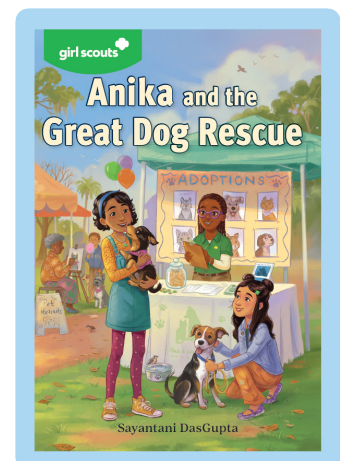
## Discussion Guide

After you and your friends have read *Anika and the Great Dog Rescue*, go over these questions and talk about how you each might answer them. These questions are about your thoughts, feelings, and ideas, so there's no right or wrong answers, just honest ones you can share with your friends to get to know each other better!

1. Anika really wants a pet, but her parents didn't allow it for a long time because it's such a big responsibility. Are there any responsibilities your parents say you're not ready for? What could you do to prepare yourself to grow and show you are responsible enough for a new challenge?
2. Harper has been Anika's best friend for a long time, but recently Harper's been hanging out with a different crowd and not being so nice to Anika. The friends fight, but by the end, it seems like they are spending time together again. Do you think their friendship can go back to normal? Why or why not? What do you think could improve the chances of them being super close friends again? What would make a difference to you if you were in Anika's shoes?
3. Volunteering at Paws and Whiskers is so fun for Anika's Girl Scout troop because they get to combine their love of animals with helping their community. What are some of your interests or favorite things and how could you use them to better your community?
4. Do you think Anika did the right thing by not telling her family right away about the stray dog? Why or why not? What would you have done?
5. Mrs. Davis might seem a bit scary at the start of the book, but by the end it turns out she's very different from what Anika first thought. How would you describe Mrs. Davis' personality? Have you ever made incorrect assumptions about someone, but then been surprised? Think about that experience. Has it made you more open minded about people in general? Why or why not?

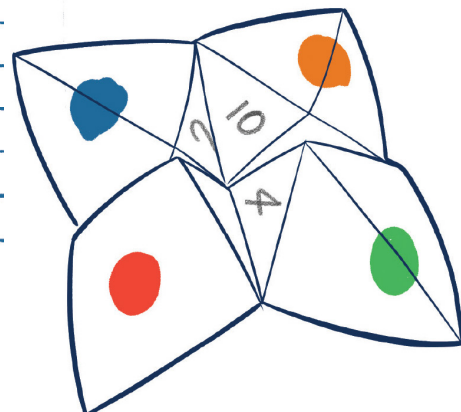

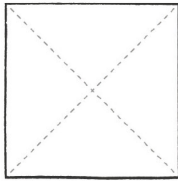

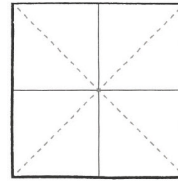
## HOW TO MAKE A FORTUNE TELLER

1



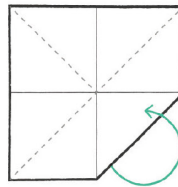
Fold the paper in half diagonally, unfold, then repeat the other way.

2



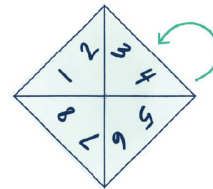
Fold the paper in half, unfold, then repeat the other way.

3



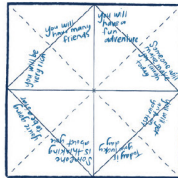
Fold the corners into the center, forming a smaller square.

4



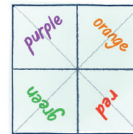
Flip the smaller square over and fold the corners into the center, forming an even smaller square. Write numbers on each triangle.

Open the flaps and write fortunes underneath each.

Close the flaps and flip the square over. Write a color on each square.

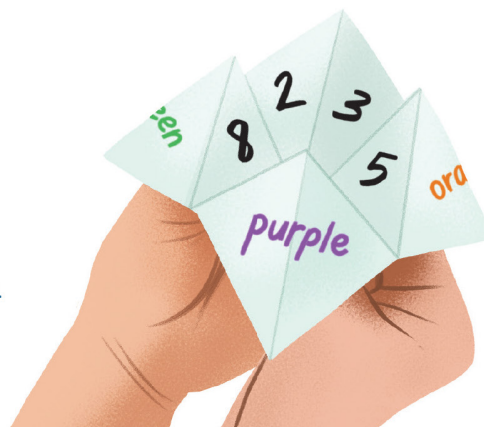

Fold in half.

Slide your fingers underneath the squares to work the fortune teller.

## Discussion Guide

After you and your friends have read *Maven Takes the Lead*, go over these questions and talk about how you each might answer them. These questions are about your thoughts, feelings, and ideas, so there's no right or wrong answers, just honest ones you can share with your friends to get to know each other better!

1. Maven has a great imagination but worries her friends will think the stories she makes up are babyish. Have you ever worried what others would think about an activity that makes you happy? If yes, what did you do? Did you decide to keep doing that activity without caring what others thought, did you do it and not tell others about it, or did you stop doing it altogether? How did that make you feel?
2. Instead of asking for help at home with her robotics project, at first Maven tries to handle it all on her own. Do you think she could have or should have asked her family or friends for help earlier? Why or why not? Has there ever been a time when it was hard for you to ask for help? Why do you think that was?
3. When Maven and her troop go to the aquarium, she and her bestie, Gemma, are separated. How does she feel when she sees Gemma and Sylvie having so much fun without her? Have you ever been in a situation where a friend of yours was becoming close to a new friend? How did it make you feel? Is there a better way Maven could have handled the situation? What would you have done?
4. Dominic says some mean things to Maven and doesn't want her to be the lead on the robotics project, but Maven refuses to back down. Why doesn't she just give up and let the boys take over? Has anyone ever made you doubt your own abilities or wonder if you were good enough to take on a task or be a part of a certain activity? If yes, how did you handle it? Was there a different way things could have gone? Would it have been better or worse?
5. It can be so fun when you and your friends are involved in the same activities. Gemma and Sylvie both love playing soccer, but Maven isn't really interested in playing sports. Do you think that makes their friendship harder in some ways? Do you think it's possible that having different interests and being involved in separate activities from your friends can actually help your friendships? Why or why not?
